A READING FROM PAUL'S LETTER TO THE ROMANS

I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me.

So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!

So then, with my mind I am a slave to the law of God, but with my flesh I am a slave to the law of sin.

Romans 7:15-25a

THE GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MATTHEW

"But to what will I compare this generation? It is like children sitting in the marketplaces and calling to one another, 'We played the flute for you, and you did not dance; we wailed, and you did not mourn.'

For John came neither eating nor drinking, and they say, 'He has a demon'; the Son of Man came eating and drinking, and they say, 'Look, a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners!' Yet wisdom is vindicated by her deeds."

At that time Jesus said, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.

"Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Matthew 11:16-19,25-end

REFLECTION

A few years ago, a friend gave me a mug which I use frequently and the inscription continues to amuse me, 'Lead me not into temptation I can find the way myself'. It strikes me, this is similar to what St Paul writes in his letter to the Romans, "I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but do the very thing I hate" (Romans 7:15). Then he goes on to say in a convoluting way 'I do not do the good that I want to do because of the evil within me'. The book of Genesis gives us an indication of where he is coming from when it illustrates that humanity was given dominion over the earth and granted the ability to do great things. With that came the resilience to cope with natural disasters such as flooding and the responsibility to care for all creatures, together with the world in which we live. It also illustrated our sinfulness and lack of resistance to temptation, because of our inherent nature.

After all, it is true, human beings are capable of great things such as: the charting of mid-ocean mountain ranges where there is always new life to be found; discoveries in the sky above us and the universe beyond; artificial intelligence and communication through technology which is beyond comprehension of most people. Our achievements in engineering, agriculture, chemistry, medicine, art, music and just about every academic field are remarkable.... and yet we keep on letting ourselves down. We are capable of creating great things and equally prone to destroying them in our arrogance and thirst for power and control.

Paul, offers some insight into this paradox of human nature. If you have been following the readings in the past few weeks you could be forgiven for thinking that Paul is obsessed with sin and yet it is a subject that we seem to fight shy of: perhaps we find his rhetorical style confusing or maybe because the subject makes us feel uncomfortable. Yet Paul had a deep-rooted personal understanding of weakness. He knew the Law of Judaism inside out and it had to be obeyed. Paul practiced the Law and persecuted others, like Jesus, who thought differently. It took a blinding light to convince Paul otherwise.

His understanding of our addiction to sin helps us to face our demons: why some people are prone to selfdestruct through addictions; why affluence can lead to reckless extravagance; and why our self-centred nature causes us to rape the planet. We try to save situations by education: if someone is addicted to nicotine or the excessive use alcohol we try to teach that they are damaging their health; that obesity, heart disease and Type 2 diabetes can be avoided by diet and exercise; that taking heroin is likely to kill you. The naive assumption is that by teaching the dangers of excess, people will stop. Teaching of course remains imperative - but equally we need to understand that our inclination to push the boundaries and take chances is like a magnet. The closer we get to it the more likely we are to become trapped, preventing us from doing the good that we need to do and leading us to a loss of self-worth and hatred of ourselves for being so weak.

It is easy to become disheartened. However, the good news is that we are all 'work in progress'. We are caught in between: we know with our heads and hearts that Christ has liberated us from sin and will shoulder the burden; while on the other hand, we know that our struggles with temptation are not over. As Paul said in his letter to the Philippians "but one

thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining toward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus. (Phil.3:13-14). Amen
